Councillor Jon London

2024 is getting off to a busy start. Over the last couple of months I have had the honour of chairing the Grants Working Party, determining who would receive allocations from the £470,000 West Suffolk Community Chest. This was probably the most difficult thing I have been asked to do as Councillor so far. You would be shocked to find out just how many of our support networks are charity led, from help with medical issues to serious crime victim support, from community centres to the Citizens Advice Bureau. So much of what we take for granted in our community would collapse overnight without ongoing charitable support.

On December 2nd I had the great pleasure of helping to organise the first Exning Christmas Tree Switch-on. This was a bit of an experiment but barring some dodgy singing by myself the event went off without a hitch. We intend on running another one next year, so if you want to be involved, get in touch! Thanks to the Exning Scouts for their help with the cosy campfire, and the Exning Parish Council who organise and fund the tree every year. Plus it's always lovely to spend time in the grounds of our historic Church of St Martins. Rev. Liam Beadle, I hope you enjoyed your first Christmas with us.

Are there any other community events you'd like to see in the village? I've already had someone ask about a bonfire night celebration, what would you want to see in Exning?

Finally, I am looking into the possibility of setting up a community group to better the village. We have so many fabulous independent groups that work to do beneficial things, and a properly constituted community group would be able to apply for grants, to help fund things the village wants but can't currently get such as a community orchard, funding for events, or whatever YOU want. 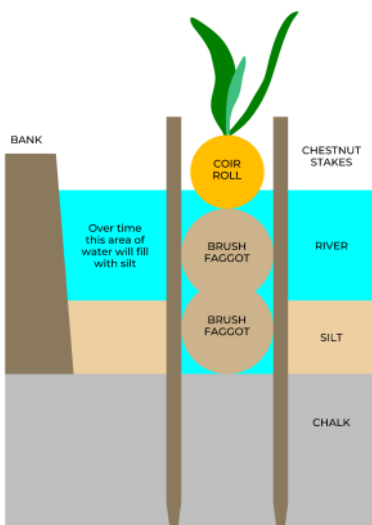

Bringing Fresh Life to our river



Rainfall in 2023 and prospects for a healthy river in 2024

The total rainfall for 2023 was 730.5 mm according to our rain gauge sited near the Duck Pond, compared to 484.6 mm in 2022. The river is now higher in the Duck Pond and Brookside than it has been for years and is still rising which means we should have a good flow of water for the coming year, maybe without the necessity to turn on the support pump. This should help our new Duck Pond planting get off to a good



start in the Spring (see diagram explaining the restorative work that the volunteers undertook in 2023). Duck Pond visitors will see a new measuring pole and that the water has risen over the faggots and two trial coir rolls that we placed. The rapid flow has exposed areas of the typical chalk stream base and the displaced silt has moved into the bank areas giving us more planting opportunities.

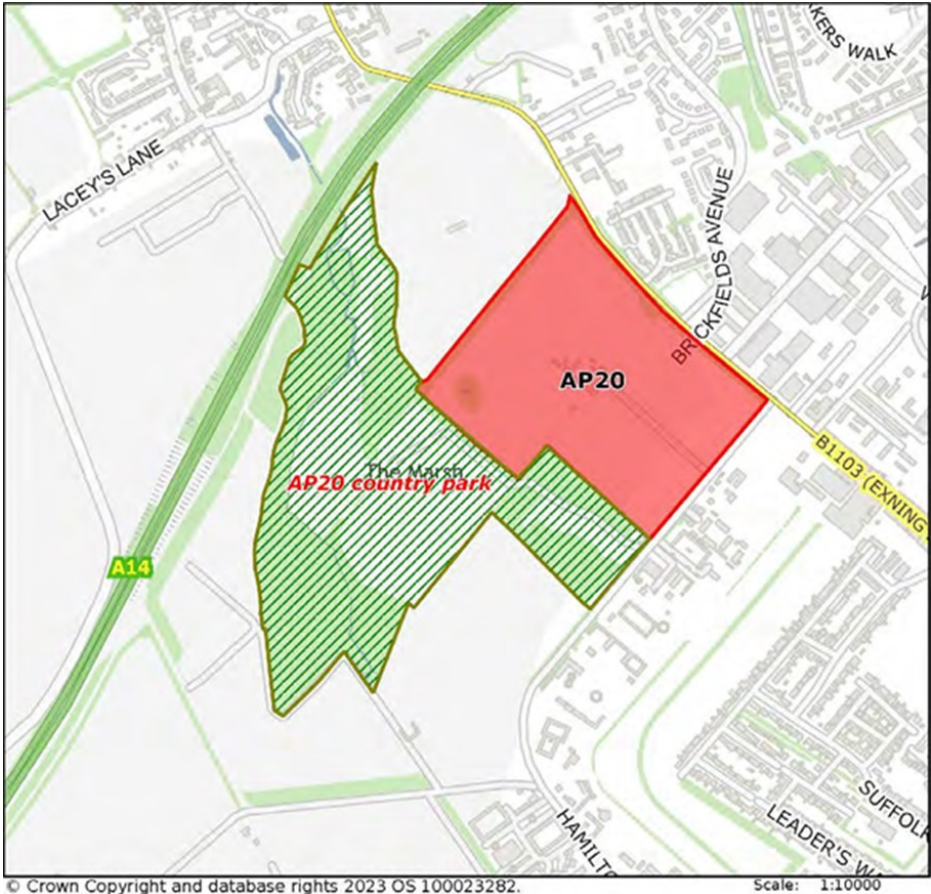

What impact will Pinewood Stud and the Country Park developments have on our river?

The West Suffolk Local Plan is out for a third and final round of consultation until Tuesday 12th March. The plan includes possible changes to the Seven Springs and Pinewood Stud areas (see outline plan over the page). We have highlighted to The Jockey Club the importance of the Springs to the Exning New River and that part of this site is rare 'wet woodland'. We believe it is essential that the aquifers which supply the New River and the Newmarket Pumping Station are protected from water loss and run off contamination, from any proposed development.

The West Suffolk Council (WSC) consultation is a chance for local communities and individuals to share how important it is to them that growth and development projects protect the environment and restore nature - as well as showing support for the many positive and ambitious environmental policies contained in the current draft.

The Suffolk Wildlife Trust (SWT) has informed us they want to encourage WSC to be even more ambitious when it comes to getting development to deliver more nature and increase biodiversity. They will be asking their own members and supporters, as well as other local people and community groups to get involved.

SWT have launched a campaign to ask WSC to double the amount of nature/ biodiversity (10% to 20%) delivered by new development. What's growing? On the Exning allotments with Phil

We are following Phil on his allotment journey, hoping to inspire others to pick up a trowel and a bag of seeds. You don't need an allotment to start your own home-grown journey; even containers are a great place to start.



What have you been planting these last few months?

Even though it is winter, there are still crops which can be planted indoors and outdoors. If you have a greenhouse this is great, but a sunny windowsill can also work really well. In December, I finished planting garlic, red and white onions, and broad beans outside. In January, I planted basil, leeks, and sweet peas inside. In February, I usually plant sprouts and radish outside, and marigolds inside.

What have you harvested over the winter?

Leeks, carrots and beetroot

Any tips/secrets you're willing to share?

If you have an indoor space, use it wisely to start what you can early, to get ahead on the growing year.

What are you harvesting now (November)?

Leeks, cabbages and beetroot.

Are you still eating from your earlier harvests?

Still enjoying our garlic and onions harvested in the summer. We hang them up so they keep well. They will last until June when the next crop is ready!

What else are you doing at this time of year?

Mapping out the allotment for the rest of the year. For healthy crops it is important to rotate where plants are grown. I move my crops in a clockwise direction around the beds in the allotment. This helps me keep track of the rotation.

Any other allotment news?

I received the 'Best New Allotment' award in 2023 on the Exning Allotments; it's great when all the hard work pays off!

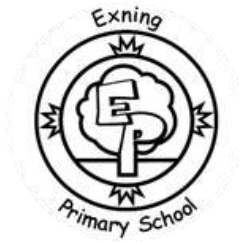

Junior Road Safety Officers

We are the Junior Road Safety Officers for Exning Primary School and our names are Archie-Lee, Clara, Lucy and Rosie. Our job is to help everyone in school learn how to be safe on and around the roads and travel in an eco-friendly way.



In the Autumn we focused on staying bright and being seen because the nights were getting darker. Hopefully spring will soon be on its way but it's still very dark late in the afternoon. On dark, rainy days it is important to remember that traffic may find it hard to spot you, so always try to wear something bright or have a bright accessory.

As a school one of our concerns is parking in front of the school and on the surrounding roads. We always remind parents and carers that it is illegal to park (or even drop off quickly) on double yellow or zig zag lines. Dangerous parking has been spotted near the zebra crossing and on the corner of King George Avenue. Parking on the zig zag lines either side of the zebra crossing blocks the view of anyone trying to cross. This particularly applies to children, being small they will certainly struggle to see over and around a parked car.

We also remind our parents and carers to respect private property. For example, the car park over the road from the school is for the use of the shops and their customers, it's not for school drop off. This also applies to the White Swan's carpark and the car park behind Olive Dental Care.

We understand that lots of people in our community are worried about road safety and traffic in the village.

International researchers learn from Exning Primary School innovation

Exning Primary School were very lucky to have nine researchers from Nazarbayev University in Astana, Kazakhstan and the University of Cambridge to visit on Tuesday 10th October. They were coming to find out some more information about the brand-new 'Peer Mediation' service that has been set up by Year 3 Class Teacher, Miss Kezia Herzog. The researchers were keen to find out how the scheme is going as they are interested in bringing peer mediation into schools in Kazakhstan.

Peer mediation is a process of resolving conflict between students. It is run by students, for students. A team of 10 children applied to be peer mediators in June and then had 4 days of professional training from Calm Mediation Centre. The training involved discussions around what conflict is, what mediation is and lots of role-play. The children mediate in the 'Mediation Hut' during lunchtimes. Two children are 'on shift' at a time, and mediate between the children that are having a disagreement. The peer mediators have blue sashes and badges so the other children know who the mediators are.

There are three simple ground rules during the mediation that the children have to follow:

Respect each other
Anyone can stop the session at any time
No interrupting

So far, the peer mediation scheme has been a great success! The mediators are really enjoying their new roles and the students of Exning Primary School have loved being able to resolve their disputes with their peers. The staff have also been highly positive, commenting on the maturity of the peer mediation team.

The benefits for the peer mediators include: developing their listening, leadership, problem solving and communication skills; learning how to express feelings and needs and a growth in their confidence and self-esteem. The process of peer mediation also empowers the children because they are able to take responsibility for their own actions.

It is a very exciting scheme that has been running since September and Exning are keen for other schools to get in touch that would like to start their own mediation service."

As we continue to celebrate, we have happy memories of the preparations for Christmas in Exning. Hey, I'm Hannah!

Did you know that dancing offers more than just physical fitness benefits? It also enhances coordination, balance, confidence, mental well-being and teamwork skills.

Even if you're not part of a dance group, you can still enjoy dancing at home. Here are some simple conditioning exercises to get you started:

- **The Plank:** Lie down, align your elbows and feet with your shoulders, and push up onto your forearms and feet, forming a flat line from ankles to neck
- **Downward Dog:** Place your hands shoulder-width apart, extend them forward, straighten your legs, and raise your hips high
- **Lunges:** Step, keeping the working knee behind the ankle line and the back leg straight. Remember to perform lunges on both legs for balanced strength

Once you're comfortable, you can try a basic step like the Chaine turn:

1. Position yourself for sideways movement (begin by moving to the right)
2. Step your right foot out in line with your body (try standing on a marked line for better practice)
3. Pivot towards your working leg, bringing the left foot in tightly (perform on a rise)
4. Complete a 360-degree turn to the right and lower your heels when finished

Maintain balance/positioning by focusing your head on a point in the line of travel.

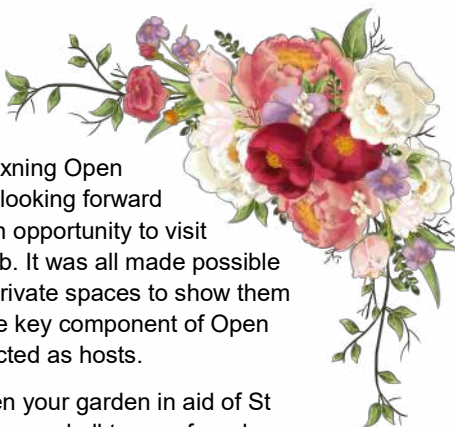

When did you take over the Wheatsheaf?

Around three years ago. Before then, we ran The Missing Sock in Stow-cum-Quy. We lived in Brinkley, so Exning was a good location, and the timing worked well for us. We were especially drawn to the large garden and B&B facilities. We have over 20 years of hospitality experience; we enjoy hosting and having a lot of people around.

What makes the Wheatsheaf different?

Our menu. We have created a British Romanian Fusion menu, all about fusing Romanian cuisines and cultural flavours with familiar British classics. Whilst people are excited to try new flavours, the dish becomes even more appealing when served in a well-loved British format. In short - creativity plus local and seasonal ingredients.

Exning's Racing History

As any longstanding Exning resident will tell you, there would be no Newmarket without Exning and so it is true that our village can boast its own rich horseracing history compared to our bigger and much more famous neighbour.

Racehorses are still a big fixture of the village nowadays and can be seen every morning stopping the traffic on their way to the gallops via the tunnel underneath the A14.

Horses walking along the roads is a sight that goes way beyond the building of the dual carriageway and before cars themselves, in fact.

Cicero was the first major winner to come from Exning when he won the Epsom Derby in a record time for trainer Percy Peck in 1905. His yard is still in operation today with Harraton Court Stables on Chapel Street currently owned by trainer Daryll Holland.

Significant success came over jumps too with Jack Horner winning the 1926 Grand National for trainer Harvey Leader whilst Golden Miller became a household name after winning the Cheltenham Gold Cup twice and the Grand National in the early 1930s. Both horses were trained from Beechwood Stables which no longer exists but was situated on what is now Beechwood Close.

It may have been a while since horses of this calibre were last trained from Exning but the village can boast a talented roster of current trainers in Daryll Holland, Gay Kelleway, Julia Feilden and Denis Quinn.

Kelleway was the first female jockey to ride a winner at Royal Ascot in 1987 and it took until 2019 for another woman to match the feat.
