Councillor Jon London

As I write this I've just returned from looking at the brand new path between Prince Close and the school. Getting this path sorted out has been a two year odyssey so far. In 2023 only the part between the school and the nursery was able to be done because the rest of the path didn't show up on the County Council's definitive map of rights of way. After pointing out this inaccuracy the rights of way team were able to confirm that this was an error, and that the path was indeed public access.



This didn't fix the fact that there was no funding for resurfacing. After several meetings with County Council officers we ended up at an impasse. They would be happy to allow someone to do the work, but they wouldn't pay for it.

After a press meeting with Persimmon (The one where they provided the Parish Council with a giant cheque for the bus stop) I was able to invite a senior Persimmon manager to see the muddy path that children living in their houses use to get to school, and convinced him that it would be a fantastic opportunity for them to contribute to the community. Thank you Persimmon!

I'd also like to thank Brian and James from Tamdown for the fantastic work they have done, the path really does look smart, and they even fixed some extra potholes by the side of the school. My next goal is to extend the path all the way through the woods to Plover Place.

I try to listen to what residents tell me they want, and I therefore did not move forward with the proposed Exning bonfire and fireworks display, as several people were concerned about the noise. One event that everyone did seem to love last year was the x-mas tree switch-on & songs, which I am pleased to announce will be happening 5pm, 1 December, at St Martins Churchyard.

Following the wet winter of 2023/2024 it has not been necessary to augment the river with water from the Snailwell borehole this summer as some of the Seven Springs have kept flowing. However, the water level dropped in the Duck Pond to 29 mm in September from its height of 54 mm in March.

At Ducks lane, a kingfisher has frequently been seen flying under the road bridge and into the Duck Pond. He often stops on one of the boxwood perches that have been placed in the river. Have you seen him? More secretive is a heron who visits in the early mornings and has been caught on the wildlife camera catching and eating the red bellied sticklebacks. Now that we are into autumn the Little Egret has returned.

The flowering plants which have given such a colourful display all summer have now died or been cut back for winter.

Over several weeks in September/October a group of volunteers cleared the many years of debris, brambles and ivy from the banks and river by the Swan Lane Bridge. This clearance work was supported by a grant given by Jon London, our West Suffolk Councillor, from his Locality Budget. Funding to purchase materials for restoration of the banks has been kindly given by Octopus Renewables Infrastructure Trust (ORiT) and it is hoped work can be started over the winter months.



After 2½ years of negotiations, BT have cleared the dead elder and laurel from the corner of Church Lane and ENRA volunteers have removed further debris. The eroded bank is now visible and it is proposed to restore this area with Chestnut stakes, faggots and planting along with adding additional gravel.

West Suffolk Local Plan - Pinewood Stud & Country Park

The Association together with the Suffolk Wildlife Trust and National Trust Wicken Fen has made representations to The Planning Inspectorate who are conducting the Examination of West Suffolk Local Plan and a proposed modification has been made to the landscape and biodiversity section. The New River drains through the National Trust's Wicken Fen Ramsar and their fen habitats are reliant on the cleaner calcareous nature of the Monks Lode water that is abstracted onto Sedge Fen from Monks Lode.

The Plan is being examined over 11 days from 5th November to 11th December at the Council Offices at Bury St Edmunds.

What are you planting (Nov/Dec)?

We've got garlic and onions going in.

What are you harvesting (Nov/Dec)?

It's a quiet time of year, but we are still picking leeks, carrots, and beetroot.

What have been the main challenges recently?

Dealing with the wet weather and there have been so many caterpillars attacking the plants!

What have been your recent successes?

A fantastic result at the allotment show, winning the following categories – carrots, dahlias, sweetcorn, butternut squash, and courgettes. I also won best male allotment holder, and second place for the most diverse plot.

What jobs are you doing at the moment?

It's too wet to dig in muck at the moment, so we are focussed on tidying the plot and taking down the runner beans; we leave the roots in so these can be dug into the soil.

What are your favourite vegetables for the Christmas Dinner table?

Definitely sprouts and parsnips.

Any other news?

In this edition, we caught up with Fiona Ouzman of Exning United Charities to learn more about the organisation and its work.

Charity Number - 204971

Q1: What is the purpose of the Charity?

The general charitable purpose is for the prevention or relief of poverty. The charity helps children/young people, elderly or old people and people with disabilities. The charity makes grants to individuals and grants to organisations.

Q2: Can you tell us about its history?

Formerly The Shepherds Charity, Exning United Charities mainly originates from the bequest of and settlement of Samuel Shepherd MP (1677-1748) whose brother Francis Shepherd MP had resided at Exning Hall. Samuel had lived at one time at Anglesey Abbey and similar bequests of land were made for the surrounding villages of the Abbey. Exning is still connected with Botisham United Charities to this day.

Q3: How can people benefit from the Charity?

Applications can be made by single people who have reached the age of 70 years or over and have had continuous residence in the Parish of Exning with St Agnes (Severals Ward) for 7 years or more.

Requests can also be made for assistance from needy persons, families and village organisations. These requests should be made in writing to the Clerk to the Trustees at 29 George Gibson Close Exning Newmarket CB8 7IE. Grants are made at the discretion of the trustees who meet regularly throughout the year.

Q4: Is there anything else you would like to tell us about the Charity?

The next distribution of vouchers is to be made on Saturday 7th December 2024 at Exning Village Hall from 9.30am until 12 noon and details can be found in the Charitable Organisations Section of this newsletter.

Remembrance Event

On Sunday November 10th, the village gathered at the Cotton End Road war memorial to pause and reflect in remembrance of those killed in conflict in the First World War and all conflicts since. The reflection was led by the Rev. Liam Beadle of St Martin's Church, and time was also taken to consider both armed personnel and civilians in present zones of conflict and disaster. Wreaths were laid by Cllrs John London and Kathryn Schosland on behalf of the District and Parish councils, with a number of community and militarily-aligned groups also leaving their tributes.

Unless adequate proof is provided, applications will be refused.

Anyone collecting on behalf of another person must provide written authority from the existing beneficiary.

Progress on new Classrooms at Chita primary school Zambia

Since the last Exning News in August, which outlined the aims of the charity to build a three classroom extension at the Primary school in Chita, exciting progress has been made.



At the end of July work started on the new building. Local people volunteered to dig the extensive foundations with pick and shovel. The foundations were then built, filled in and the slab laid and finished. The four walls have now reached roof level, and the roof plate has been put in place.

Weather and funding issues permitting, the aim is to have the classrooms ready for children to occupy on Feb 1st.

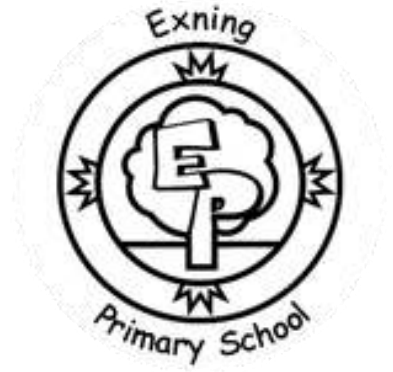

Exning School Harvest

We have had a very busy few months in the school polytunnel. The children were very enthusiastic and did a splendid job of making sure that the plants were watered daily, as well as, harvesting copious amounts of tomatoes and cucumbers. Our strawberries, peas and beans were not as successful, unfortunately, but we did grow a dozen potatoes and enjoy many raspberries - the raspberries were very popular and eaten as they were picked!



Last week, we harvested the last of the tomatoes and then stripped the plants out of the polytunnel and prepared the ground for winter, as well as a general tidy around and sweep up. The children did a fantastic job, although we all ended up rather muddy! We also cut back the raspberry plants, as they had become a bit unruly. At the same time, we harvested the last of the pears and apples from the trees - the children enjoyed sampling these.

We are still looking for a local volunteer with green fingers to support us with this project. The children are extremely enthusiastic but we are not very knowledgeable, hence how our success is hit and miss! We will start to plan for next year's growing season over the next few months - if anyone can spare some time to support us it would be greatly appreciated.

The chickens continue to delight the children, and there is a small crew of pupils who have taken on the responsibility of caring for them very seriously and are doing a fantastic job. The chickens are still laying an egg a day, which the children take turns at taking home to eat.

We are thankful for this year's harvest and hope to be as, if not more, productive next year.



Communicating with Friends @ Exning

A huge thank you to everyone who posted their blue Tesco tokens in the Exning voting box last year. We won a £1500 grant to purchase communication boards in the outdoor areas at the school.

Communication boards are a board of symbols that children can point to, to communicate with their friends and adults. Some children find speech difficult which means they may find it tricky to make their friends understand what they want to express - if words are hard for them to say, they may be able to show what they are trying to say by pointing at the symbols on a communication board. The boards are also a useful tool to model to children how to make choices and develop their language skills.

The boards are up in key places around the school and are already being used effectively, for children to communicate with. We are extremely pleased with them and excited to support all the children across our school.

Faith and Worship

A letter from the minister, St Martin's Church

I write in the aftermath of Remembrance Sunday. A large number of us gathered at the war memorial opposite the White Horse for the customary two-minutes silence in memory of those whose lives have been blighted by war and conflict, and especially those who were killed in warfare. I often wonder what people are thinking about during those two minutes. I find my mind wanders to contemporary conflicts and the hope for peace which is shared by all people of goodwill. In church, we often pray, '*Give peace in our time, O Lord*'. In the context of the ongoing conflict in Ukraine and the atrocities in the Middle East, among others, it has felt like a timely prayer. But it is not just a prayer for the world. It is also a prayer for ourselves. Jesus says, '*Blessed are the peacemakers*', and making peace is not just for the world stage. It begins in our own households, and even, dare



I say it, in our own selves. For that reason, it is good that Advent and Christmas come shortly after November. The shops try to lure us into a celebration of Christmas that makes Advent invisible, but this is a shame. Advent is about the renewal of all things. For Christians, this is focused on our faith that Jesus will come again as the judge of the living and the dead. It is a stark time, but for that reason it is able to speak to us in difficult days. The Christmas services will be advertised shortly. In them, we hear God's offer of peace with God through faith in Jesus Christ. '*Peace on earth*' was the song of the angels at the birth of Jesus. Whatever our faith, I hope we can all echo that other-worldly but desperately needed hope. **Liam Beadle**

Update from the Parish Council



Autumn 2024

Welcoming Steve

The change of season brought us a change in Village Keeper. Tom, who has looked after us wonderfully for so many years handed over to Steve, who will now work full time and all the year round, to 'keep' the village. Steve is an experienced, certified groundsperson and Exning resident. Wave if you see him at work! The council took the decision to take a full time keeper to give us capacity through the winter to work on essential maintenance and keep up a year round mowing schedule, and with regard to the future responsibilities that may come our way.

Stench Pipes

We've learned a great deal in this quarter about these, of which Exning has a number of examples. Also known as Stink Pipes or Stench Poles, historically these cast iron structures were part of the Victorian sewage infrastructure and vented flammable and unpleasant gases from the underground networks, high into the sky and away from discerning noses and naked flames! Happily our systems no longer rely on these to prevent

unfortunate explosions and big stinks and they persist for architectural interest. We are looking at the condition of ours and whether they need ongoing maintenance and protection. Ours are particularly ornate and we are looking forward to learning more.

Other Matters in Council

Recreation Ground Play Area

Sadly the ageing equipment continues to deteriorate in appearance and function, although still passes the weekly and monthly mandatory safety checks. Ongoing repairs are increasingly expensive and technically difficult.

Agreeing a new design and costing for the replacement is a priority in 2025 and we will be looking for your ideas about what should be available in the new facility to make it as inclusive and engaging as possible for our users.



Play areas are expensive and initial scoping shows that there isn't yet enough in the pot. There are options. The pot is not insignificant thanks the Parish Council's history of responsible financial planning. But it is the case that this project is going to involve seeking grants, fundraising and matched funding options to get us over the line.

While on the surface, the play area is a project for young people and families, everyone in Exning benefits from a well kept, well used space. Dereliction, for instance, attracts antisocial behaviour. Many families in Exning don't have a garden or significant private recreation space and some people experience social isolation, even if they have children, and the park and recreation ground provide a vital space to connect and be supported.

So please do get behind the team and if you are part of an organisation who would like to support the Play Park Project directly, please get in touch with the Parish Council.
