District Council News

Councillor Jon London

The nights are drawing in, summer is over and quite a bit has happened at West Suffolk Council.

The new Local Plan is now in full effect, detailing what can and cannot be granted planning permission in West Suffolk. As the vice-chair of the Development Control Committee I have seen its effects, both good and bad. If we did not have a Plan, we would not be able to control speculative development, but one new thing it allows is town-centre developments with no parking. So far I have seen four of these come through, luckily none in Exning, but it is a worrying trend that is going to



stress parking in Newmarket and other towns to breaking point.

For a third year running I have been elected Chair of the Grants Advisory Committee and I am happy to see that a record number of organisations from Exning have applied. We have received over £1.2m of charitable requests from across West Suffolk, but we have only £220k to give so much thought and debate will be needed to make sure that those organisations that truly need funding get it.

Finally I would like to say that I am still pushing for the woodland path on the edge of the new development to be made a public footpath. All landowners now agree but there is still an unusually complex process to make it work.

Bringing Fresh Life to our river

Autumn Update - October 2024

Brookside/Church Lane

At the end of August and beginning of September volunteers spent two mornings improving the river flow speed in Brookside/Church Lane by placing 5 bags of 40 mm and 20 mm gravel along the bottom of the road bank. They also drove Chestnut stakes into the river bed and laid faggots between them to shore up the crumbling bank by the BT Exchange.





Dr Steve Boreham

At the beginning of October, there was an excellent turn out at the Exning Community Church Hall when Dr Steve Boreham (geologist, ecologist and an 'expert' on chalk springs and streams) gave a fascinating talk on the geological history of the Seven Springs. After which Jeremy Ricketts explained that Steve had trained him in using the water analysis equipment sponsored by the Octopus Renewals Infrastructure Trust (ORIT). To date he explained that due to the lack of rain over the past year it has only been possible to collect spring water from the Roman Baths, which are part of the lower Seven Springs. The good news is that the results so far classify the spring water as High/Good under the Water Framework Directive, which are the two highest levels of cleanliness




After a number of in depth questions on chalk streams the evening was rounded off by the audience 'tucking into' homemade cakes and biscuits.

Changing scenery

The change in the temperatures brings a change in the focus of our groundskeeping, with Steve switching from relentless mowing and watering to essential winter maintenance. The wild areas get their strim in Autumn, encouraging regeneration after maintaining wildlife habitats for as long as possible.

In council we continue to discuss expanding our scenery. While agreement has been reached that the Parish Council will adopt the green space of Chancery Park phase 1, the terms of the handover have yet to be settled and we work to pursue resolution on this.

Speeding

We heard from a number of villagers in this quarter about speeding concerns. on Church Street, Cotton End Road and Windmill Hill. Enforcement teams were out at the beginning of November and we have requested these three roads be regularly monitored in rotation so expect to see them in action.

In October, Councillor Grzech attended a Highways meeting about traffic measures, attended by multiple Parish Councils with similar concerns. Cost is a concern, driven up by legal processes such as Traffic Regulation Orders (TROs) on which there must be consultation and due process. The Parish Council is in favour of 20 mph zones.

In contrast to Cambridgeshire and even Mid Suffolk, West Suffolk lacks access to specific funds that would help with the cost of Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) which are an evidence-based intervention.

Common to all three roads is the presence of a 40 mph stretch that, with more recent development, is now inside residential areas. We are exploring the possibility of adjusting down the speed limits to remove the short 40 mph stretches on Windmill Hill and Church Street through to Exning Road.

In the meantime, softer influences are possible and if you live in one of the highlighted areas, your copy of the Exning News contains "20's plenty" wheelie bin stickers. On bin day, place your bin on the pavement with the stickers facing oncoming traffic as a reminder to limit speed.

Community Grants

The Parish Council has a small amount of ringfenced money that can be awarded in what is known as a Section 137 grant. The purpose is to support local community organisations with projects that benefit the residents of Exning. Previous recipients include Exning Primary School, Stepping Stones Preschool, Exning New River Association, Exning Tennis Club and 1st Exning Scouts. If you think that your organisation could be eligible for an award, contact the Clerk for more information.

Bulb Planting with Exning 1st Scouts

Speaking of scouts, on November 21st we will be undertaking a joint project to add colour to village spaces. Our scouts regularly participate in activities that contribute positively to the village. Thanks to a generous donation from Mr Fothergills and further support from scouting families, we will be planting a carpet of crocuses and other bulbs at the Eastern entrance to the Recreation Ground.

We hope that this establishes a colourful display that is enjoyed for years to come and if you have any bulbs of your own you can spare, please pop down between 1.30 and 3.30 on the 21st and add to the pile!

Christmas Tree Light Switch on 30th November



Towards the middle of the month our beautiful spruce will arrive and Manchetts will place it for us in the churchyard of St Martins.

Please join us on the evening of the 30th November from 5pm, and enjoy a hot chocolate, a mulled wine, a mince pie and some carols.

Remembrance reflections

The Parish Council arranges the logistics for the village reflection at the war memorial. Vice Chair Kathryn Schosland laid a wreath, as did District Councillor Jon London and representatives from community groups in Exning. Reflections were lead by the Rev Peter Gill.

On the beat

Since July 2025, the Community Policing Team (CPT) has been active in Exning, focusing on patrols, youth engagement, and crime prevention. Officers have worked with schools on safety education and responded to local concerns, particularly around anti-social behaviour.

Exning remains a low-crime area compared to nearby towns. Suffolk continues to rank among the safest counties in England, with rural communities like ours seeing fewer incidents overall. Most local reports involve minor public order or nuisance behaviour.

As winter approaches, CPT encourages residents to:

- Lock doors and windows early
- Use timer switches for lights
- Clear frost from vehicles before driving
- Check on vulnerable neighbours
- Stay alert to seasonal scams

Residents can now sign up for Suffolk Connected, a free messaging service from Suffolk Police. It provides updates on local incidents, crime prevention advice, and community events. To register, visit

The organisation will make a distribution to single people who have reached the age of 70 years or over and have had continuous residence in the Parish of Exning with St Agnes (Severals Ward) for 7 years or more on **Saturday 6 December 2025** from 9.30am until 12 noon at Exning Community Church Hall.

All new applicants for 2025 must produce

- proof of identity (passport, driving licence or birth certificate)
- proof of address (utility bill /bank statement less than 3 months old and
- proof of length of residence in the parish before they can be accepted

Unless adequate proof is provided, applications will be refused.

Anyone collecting on behalf of another person must provide written authority from the existing beneficiary.



Godly Play in Exning

Godly Play for 3–6-year-olds and their families will run on the following dates from 9:15- 10:45am at Exning Community Church Hall: 26 October 2025, 16 November 2025, 21 December 2025. We very much hope to see you there!

Godly Play originates in the USA from the work of Dr Jerome Berryman, an Episcopalian priest. Jerome and his wife, Thea, studied in Bergamo, Italy at the centre for Montessori training and there he first met Catechesis of the Good Shepherd https://www.cgsuk.org/ which was put together by Sofia Cavalletti (1917-2011) who was an associate of Dr Maria Montessori (1870-1952) and a firm believer in taking children's spirituality seriously (Berryman 2013, 78-85). Godly Play U.K https://www.godlyplay.uk/ was developed by Dr Rebecca Nye (Berryman 2013, 166).

Godly Play offers at least seven aspects to aid children and others to find their own way to express themselves spiritually. The story is one aspect which contains a setting up of the metaphor with the participants engaging together with the story teller before settling into the actual storytelling where all eyes and hearts are concentrated on the presentation being shared. The surrounding aspects are: preparation; welcome; wondering (after the story where eye contact and group participation is important); response time; the feast; goodbye.

From St Martin's Church

I am writing this on the last evening of British Summer Time. Whether we should continue on British Summer Time and have lighter evenings all year round is a probably matter of opinion. But what the darker evenings do mean is that we are heading into a time of year when we inevitably begin to think about the themes of later autumn – Remembrance Sunday among them, but also the Church's festival of All Saints, and the journey towards Advent with its themes of waiting.



Many will also be observing Hallowe'en. Historically, it is the Vigil of All Saints' Day – that is, a day of preparation to celebrate the great heroes of the Christian faith. At All Saints'-tide we inevitably remember not only luminaries, but also the less well known people who have been dear to us and have died. So it is hardly surprising that this time of year became associated with death. The observance of Remembrance Sunday less than a fortnight later underlines the theme. We are grateful for those who died in the service of our country, but also sad that their sacrifice was necessary. And we pray for the

peace of the world, in all its complexity.

In church, remembrance is not only sad. It is also hopeful. At the heart of the good news is the death and resurrection of Jesus – the belief that he, on our behalf, has gone through death to new and eternal life, and that this life can be ours. If the darker nights and the focus on death seem heavy, this promise is light in both senses of the word. Jesus said, 'My yoke is easy, and my burden is light.'

I'd still prefer to have lighter evenings. But perhaps the darkness helps us to appreciate the light all the more.

John's excellent carrot cake recipe went down a storm, much like the weather, at Exning fete. Here it is for you to try at home

Cake ingredients

Frosting ingredients

300 ml sunflower oil
5 medium eggs
350 g light brown sugar
400-500 g grated carrots (grated weight)
150 g raisins
Zest of 2 oranges
400 g self raising flour
2 tsps bicarbonate of soda
3 tsps mixed spice
2 tsps ground ginger

125 g unsalted butter (room temp)
125 g icing sugar
250 g Mascarpone or full fat cream cheese
1 tsp vanilla extract
1 tsp mixed spice
1/2 tsp ground ginger
1/2 tsp ground cinnamon

Preheat the oven to 180°c/160°c fan and line a 9x13" tin with parchment paper

Add the oil, eggs, sugar and carrots to a bowl and mix

Add the raisins, orange zest and mix

2 tsps ground cinnamon

Add the flour, bicarb and spices and mix

Pour into the tin and bake for 45 minutes or until a skewer comes out clean and leave to cool in the tin

Beat the butter on its own until smooth

Add the icing sugar and spices and beat until smooth

Add the cream cheese and mix again

Decorate the cake with the frosting, and sprinkles and chopped nuts if you fancy
